COMPETITION GUIDELINES

Eligibility

Any high school senior slated to graduate in 2025. This competition includes public and private schools as well as home-schooled students.

In order for us to better prepare for our event, we hope to hear from you right away if you plan to take part in this competition. Artwork Theme

The theme of this competition is "What I Dream of for My Future" and should be a visual depiction of where the student sees themself five to ten years after they graduate. If words are used in the artwork, they should be kept to a minimum.

Judging and Winners

- A panel of judges will review all entries and select a winner from each of the following categories:
- **Painting and Drawing**
- **Digital Art**
- Stained Glass, Mosaic, Ceramics
- In addition to the winners for each category, one overall "Best of Show" winner will be selected.
- Prizes are as follows:

\$1500 in cash prizes will be awarded in 3 categories.

"Best of Show" will receive a \$1000 award amount.

Judging Criteria

- 1. Interpretation and clarity of theme
- 2. Creativity and originality of artwork
- 3. Quality of artistic composition & design
- 4. Overall impression of art

Accepted Mediums

Any of the following mediums or techniques may be used:

- Painting (watercolor, acrylic, gouache, oil, pastels, etc.)
- Drawing (graphite, charcoal, colored pencil, marker, pen & ink)
- Original digital illustrations
- Three-dimensional pieces (stained glass, mosaic, ceramics)

Size Requirements

- Wall art is not to exceed 30" x 30" and must be FRAMED (under glass or stretched canvas), WIRED FOR HANGING, and suitable for public display.
- Projects should not exceed 25 pounds in weight.

Multiple Entries

Up to two entries per student may be submitted, from one or multiple categories.

Submissions

Visit ASPIRINGARTISTAWARD.com, complete the online application and submit. Download a copy of the application, fill out and securely attach the form to your art before entering your project.

Deadline for Entries

Entries are to be delivered to the First United Methodist Church of London, 52 N. Main St, London, OH 43140. Dates for drop off as follows: January 9, 11am-3pm or January 10 & 11 (DEADLINE), 10am-12pm. Enter through the door off the back parking lot near the garage marked OFFICES/DELIVERIES. Directional signage will be posted inside of church.

Awards will be announced and artwork will be displayed during the 'Young Artist Showcase' which is held annually and sponsored by the Madison County Arts Council. This event begins at 3pm on Sunday, January 26, 2025 and will take place at First United Methodist Church of London, 52 N. Main St, London, OH 43140. A reception for all artists will follow the performance. All art entries for this contest will also be exhibited the month of February at London City Hall, 20 S. Walnut St, London, OH 43140.
